APSTA Partners KAIPTC On Mental Health Course

APSTA Secretariat in collaboration with KAIPTC, sponsored 15 nominees from Member Institutions (MIs) for the online course on Mental Health and Psycho-Social Support (MHPSS) organised by KAIPTC. The course was aimed at enhancing the capacity of participants to respond effectively to mental health and psychosocial issues in Peace support Operations and the work environment. The introduction and course navigation were held on 4th June 2024 virtually by KAIPTC e-learning team for all participants. The course was self-paced with each module taking approximately 45-70 minutes to view. Each module consisted of text, images, infographics, audios, videos, case studies, self-tests and quizzes. A final test of 40 questions with a pass mark of 80% was required for completion and certification. The course objectives were to: Understand the basic concepts, strategies of dealing with psychological and psychosocial impact of violent conflict; Understanding the extent to which violent conflict shatters the social fabric of the family unit, community and nation; The impact of trauma and post-traumatic stress on peacekeepers and mission as a whole; and Developing skills to manage stress in a mission environment ...

is Ghana heading towards election-related unrest?



Ahead of the December 2024 elections, heightened mistrust in state institutions and unresolved tensions threaten to disrupt the polls.

On 7 December, Ghanaians will vote for a new president and 275 Members of Parliament. This will be the country's ninth consecutive election since returning to constitutional rule in 1992.

Ghana is renowned in West Africa for democracy and political stability partly because disputes over the results of two of these elections (2012 and 2020) were resolved through the law courts. Also, power has peacefully alternated between the country's two main political parties, the ruling New Patriotic Party (NPP) and the opposition National Democratic Congress (NDC), three times - in 2001, 2009 and 2017.

However the NDC says the NPP plans to rig the elections, and the two parties disagree on the neutrality of the Electoral Commission (EC) and the courts and security services. This could lead to violence and instability ...








Peacekeeping This Month - June 2024

Regional conflict prevention and peacebuilding in Africa: pathway for the New Agenda for Peace



The New Agenda for Peace must recognise and promote African agency and leadership in regional responses to crises on the continent.

The United Nations Secretary-General's proposal for a New Agenda for Peace (NAP) is a timely call to address the critical gaps in global multilateralism. This report provides African perspectives on selected aspects of the NAP. It argues that existing prevention and peacebuilding frameworks must be revitalised. Global, regional and sub-regional decision-making processes should be aligned and existing partnerships must be revisited, enhanced and deepened as required. Adequate resourcing is also needed for African peace support operations and peacebuilding endeavours.
